It has been the easiest budget to put together for a least five years. Thanks to the State and Federal Governments' support, and Main Roads, we have a good deal of work on and good community projects to complete. We look forward to bringing those projects in, on time and within budget. This will be achieved especially by our construction teams, local contractors, local tradies, engineers and administration staff.

The tough job with any budget is that some of the projects on the wish list did not make the cut this year so they have been held over. Hopefully another round of the Works for Queensland funding may be announced before the next financial year to assist us to add a couple of these projects.

One exciting project we have is to build freedom of choice parks in Jericho, Aramac and Muttaburra. These will be at Red Bank, Jericho; Aramac Creek and beside the town dam at Muttaburra. This will link the three communities and take in the Sculpture Trail, Lake Dunn, and the Muttaburrasaurus Interpretation Centre amongst other attractions, and pull visitors off the Capricorn and Landsborough highways.

I understand the pressure our rural people are under at the moment with the drought, which in some cases is in its seventh year. This is the driest period since pre 1900s in some areas. The Farm Household Allowances have been extended out to four years and there are many other areas of support the Governments are trying to implement however we just need rain. Surely this summer it will break.

Community drought support funding

June

2018

Barcaldine Regional Council has allocated \$75,000 of Community Drought Support Funding to 38 local community groups. The funds from the Department of Communities, Disability Services and Seniors have been distributed to organisations that provide local community events and activities that contribute to connectedness, social well-being and increase access to support services.

The total amount of funding requested by community groups was \$174,800.

Mayor Rob Chandler said: "the funding received interest from a large number of community groups and applications were of a high merit. It was a difficult task to assess the applications and distribute the funding to the budget of \$75,000. Due to the strict guidelines, ultimately some community groups were unsuccessful."

What do the new markings mean?


Barcaldine Regional Council has introduced new parking signs to designate parking spaces reserved for people with mobility issues. These are different to the Disability parking permits that are issued and maintained by the Department of Transport and Main Roads.



The black and yellow signs do not replace the blue and white signs and will be used throughout the region as additional disability parking spaces. They may only be used by drivers who have permanent or temporary mobility

issues. However, you do not require a permit to use this space, but must have a genuine mobility issue.

Australian Disability Parking Scheme permit holders (both individual and organisation) in Queensland are entitled to park in these spaces.




Red permit, you must not park in any disability parking space. People with limited mobility need these spaces to easily get in and out of their vehicle and are located in areas that are easy to access.

If you park in a blue and white signed disability parking bay without a permit displayed, you may be fined.

If a once parking line is covered in black, this is no longer a parking space.

A number of parking spaces now have 5 or 15 min parking only. Please be aware of these parking spaces when parking.



The National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) is the new way of providing support for Australians with disability.

The NDIS will provide over 460,000 Australians under the age of 65 who have a permanent and significant disability with the reasonable and necessary supports they need to live an ordinary life.

The NDIS is now available in the Rockhampton, Gladstone and west to the borders region, which includes the Barcaldine Region.

The Early Childhood Early Intervention partner - BUSHkids, as well as our Local Area Cordination partner - Carers Queensland Limited, will support the rollout of the NDIS in this region.

Barcaldine Racecourse upgrade

The Barcaldine Racecourse turf track was officially opened on Saturday 5 May 2018 as part of the Barcaldine Tree of Knowledge Festival by the Hon Stirling Hinchliffe, Minister for Local Government, Minister for Racing and Minister for Multicultural Affairs.

This is a first for outback Queensland being the only turf track west of Emerald. It is envisaged that this will give an economic boost to the region and will be an advantage for western horses needing to barrier trial prior to taking on the better horses to our east.



The project is proudly funded by the Queensland Government in association with Barcaldine Regional Council in an amount of \$750,000.

Barcaldine Regional Council – 2019 Budget

Barcaldine Regional Council adopted its 2019 budget at its General Meeting held on Wednesday 27 June 2018.

Ratepayers can expect an overall average rate increase of 2.00% for the 2019 financial year.

Mayor Rob Chandler said: "This year will see the completion of some significant projects including the Barcaldine Recreation Park, internal fitout of the Muttaburrasaurus Interpretation Centre, a new Aramac Showground Ablution Block, upgrades to the Medical Centre in Jericho and upgrade of the dining area at the Alpha Showground.

Council will be performing some significant Main Roads contracts in the coming year including the Clermont-Alpha Road, Muttaburra-Aramac Road, Barcaldine-Aramac Road and Torrens Creek Road. This will ensure our works crews are fully employed.

Planned town streets upgrades include Acacia St in Barcaldine, Porter St and McAuliffe St in Aramac, Edkins St and Sword St in Muttaburra and Burns St and Moore St in Alpha.

Council has also budgeted \$2.4m for rural road upgrades including concrete floodways.

Due to the ongoing drought, Council has adopted a new excess water charge methodology. This should provide some relief to residents having difficulty in maintaining their gardens."
